A Mission for Today!

ccording to Johns Hopkins University, more than 26% of Americans over the age of 18 currently suffer from a diagnosable mental disorder in a given year. Many of those suffer from multiple disorders such as, depression that leads to alcohol abuse and increased anxiety. As one might expect, the current pandemic threatens to exacerbate these situations as individuals are more isolated than at any time in our country's history.

In addition to these growing threats to mental health, we live in a culture struggling to answer life's biggest questions. Who are we? What is the meaning of life? Does God exist? Does living a virtuous life even matter? Behaviors that were once widely agreed upon as the foundation of a healthy society are now called into question. Many grow up in a melting pot of insecurity, confusion, and indifference, longing for transcendent love and purpose.

Studies show that in as much as 66% of mental health consultations patients desire to discuss spiritual matters with their providers, while less than 30% of practitioners feel competent or prepared to discuss faith related topics. According to the most recent Gallop poll on faith in America, 65% of citizens regard their faith as important in their lives. If this disconnect between mental health solutions and patients' faith and guiding moral principles continues, millions of individuals will remain in distress and needlessly suffer.

In an address to members of the American Psychiatric Association, St. John Paul II spoke of the need to blend the best of science with the best

of faith in healing the whole person: "By its very nature your work often brings you to the threshold of human mystery. It involves sensitivity to the tangled workings of the human mind and heart, and openness to the ultimate concerns that give meaning to people's lives. These areas are of the utmost importance to the Church, and they call to mind the urgent need for a constructive dialogue between sciences and religion for the sake of shedding greater light on the mystery of man in his fullness."

Divine Mercy University, formerly known as The Institute for the Psychological Sciences, with its graduate degree programs, research projects and cutting edge partnerships, was founded to fill the "urgent need" mentioned by St. John Paul II. We are dedicated to the renewal of the Catholic-Christian intellectual tradition and the integration of the theoretical and empirical bases of psychology. As one of the only authentically Catholic, fully accredited international centers for scholarship and professional education in the field of mental health, DMU is dedicated to the study of the mind and soul grounded in an integral Catholic-Christian view of the human person.


n July 2020, Divine Mercy University Press (DMU Press) published the textbook entitled A Catholic Christian Meta-Model of the Person: Integration with Psychology and Mental Health Practice. The volume employs the insights of three wisdom traditions—the psychological sciences, philosophy, and theology—to provide a framework for understanding the person and for application in mental health practice. The book received a 2020 Expanded Reason Award given by the Vatican Foundation Joseph Ratzinger / Benedict XVI and Universidad Francisco de Vitoria Madrid.

The editors of the volume are professors at Divine Mercy University: Dr. Paul C. Vitz, Dr. William J. Nordling, and Dr. Craig Steven Titus. Other contributors to the book include a multidisciplinary team of scholars that have worked together on the Meta-Model for 20 years.

PSY.D. IN CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY

raduates of the Institute for the Psychological Sciences' (IPS)
Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) in Clinical Psychology program
are trained to address today's mental health challenges by utilizing advanced psychotherapy skills, psychological testing, and a focus
on specific pathologies and concepts within the field of psychology.

Our Psy.D. graduates are working in a variety of settings and positions: private practice, outpatient clinics, diocesan consultation, with the military, and as faculty for clinical psychology programs.

The Psy.D. program consists of 122 semester credit hours of course-work: 103 credit hours of psychology, 10 credit hours of integrative studies in philosophy and theology, and a minimum of 9 credit hours of dissertation research. Students must also complete a minimum of 1,800 hours of clinical externship (with the initial year of practicum training occurring in the IPS Center for the Psychological Services and additional training occurring in both secular and nonsecular off-site clinical settings), pass a comprehensive examination, author and defend a doctoral dissertation, and complete 2,000 hours in an APPIC-member pre-doctoral internship.

The Psy.D. program includes a Master of Clinical Psychology (M.Psy.) degree, which is awarded to students who have maintained a GPA of at least 3.00 in all course work and completed the first five semesters of study.

The IPS Psy.D. program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of the American Psychological Association (APA).*

M.S. IN PSYCHOLOGY

he Master of Science in Psychology is a 36-credit hour, 100% online graduate program that has traditionally been designed to be completed in two years of enrolled study. However, this year we are excited to be able to accommodate busy working professionals with two FAST TRACK options – one completed in 16 months and the other completed in 20 months. Both programs are eligible for a 50% tuition reduction on all courses taken in the second term during the program. This accumulates to a savings of up to \$3,000 in tuition, which can be combined with other scholarships and financial aid.

The online M.S. program provides graduates with professional competency in psychology while developing an integrative understanding of the human person in application to service delivery.

The program seeks to promote advanced professional skills such as communication, interpersonal dynamics, leadership, budgeting, program evaluation, and cultural awareness in order to enable growth as a transformational leader in a service-delivery setting.

This degree prepares students for a wide variety of opportunities in the helping professions and in education, especially those which require graduate training.

Through DMU's unique curriculum, alumni will become transformational leaders, strengthened by Catholic-Christian teachings on human dignity and informed by foundations in modern psychology. DMU specializes in a psychology curriculum that roots every course in a Catholic-Christian understanding of the human person.





MEET THE PROGRAM DIRECTOR

joined the faculty of the Master of Science in Psychology (MSP) in 2015, when courses were still being developed and the program was just being launched. From the beginning, I was impressed with the team approach to develop courses. Faculty from psychology and integrative studies joined together to ensure that every course was grounded in the Catholic-Christian view of the person. Being part of the course development process was an incredible experience.

One of my greatest joys in teaching in the MSP are the interactions with students from all continents of this world. I help equip students from various cultures and walks of life to grasp psychological topics from a Catholic-Christian view of the person. Some of our students have been priests and sisters from around the globe, businessmen from the USA, doctors from the Caribbean, or heads of pregnancy centers. Through their studies in the MSP, graduates are uniquely prepared to excel in their future careers and ministries.

While the MSP already reaches a broad, international body of students, our goal is to expand this student body even further by adding more specific areas of psychological studies. Our hope is that individuals trained in psychology grounded in the Catholic-Christian view of the person will be able to apply these skills in a variety of settings, such as business leadership and management, diocesan ministry, service environments for individuals of all different age, and culture groups, education, law enforcement, and many more.

M.S. IN COUNSELING

he students enrolled in the Master of Science in Counseling degree program gain professional competency while developing an integrative understanding of the human person in application to the counseling profession. Students acquire the necessary counseling knowledge, skills, and dispositions to engage in communities as effective community leaders and advocates for justice informed by Catholic-Christian social teachings.

The online counseling degree program requires 66 semester credit hours of coursework, a practicum experience of 100 hours with a minimum of 40 hours of direct services and an internship of 600 hours with a minimum of 240 hours of direct service. Students are also required to travel to complete three extended weekend residencies in the duration of the program.

Graduates of the M.S. in Counseling program will be prepared to:

- exhibit a vibrant professional counselor identity with the foundational knowledge and skills of the profession,
- enter the client's life narrative with compassion and respect,
- develop person-centered, comprehensive case conceptualization for effective treatment planning,
- employ basic social and behavioral sciences, a habit of evidential reasoning, and the multiple roles of professional counseling to promote human flourishing, and
- embody a vision of the flourishing person that inspires them, as professional counselors, and their clients to have the courage to trust, hope, and love.

MEET THE DEAN

PAST, PRESENT, FUTURE

Past

As I write this year's annual report, I am simply amazed at where the School of Counseling is at today and deeply grateful for the students, faculty, staff, administration, board members, and donors who had the vision, adventurous spirit, and trust in God for going on this journey together in creating the online Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program.

The journey began for me on Wednesday, May 6, 2015, as I sat down for lunch with Dr. Barry Sugarman, then the Provost at Institute for the Psychological Sciences (IPS). My mind was puzzling over what, would be the topic of this lunch as it was a last minute invite. He told me that the board had proposed that IPS should have an online master's degree in counseling to be more accessible to those students who wanted to be trained in counseling individuals, couples, and families and asked would I be willing to lead this initiative with a start date of Fall 2016. The journey had begun.

In a two-day conference near the end of November 2015, Dr. Stephen Grundman and I with nationally known Counselor Educators, board members, IPS faculty, and staff met to develop the broad outline of the new Master of Science in Counseling degree with the heart and soul of the program being our Catholic-Christian vision of the human person flourishing. In another two-day conference, with our Counselor Education consultants, we developed the basic outline of the curriculum and the content and learning objectives for each course for the Clinical Mental Health Counseling program in the M.S. in Counseling degree.

The Spring and Summer of 2016 saw Drs. Benjamin Keyes, Matthew McWhorter, and Stephen Sharp hired as our first full-time faculty, Laura Mayers hired as Academic Assistant, 27 applicants interviewed, the development of courses with each course embedded with an integration of how humans develop, grow, and heal from a Catholic-Christian worldview, and the first cohort of 21 students in our first 8-week course. This course, COUN 510 Foundations and Ethics of Clinical Mental Health Counseling, ended with a Wednesday through Sunday residency at the Sheraton Suites in Old Town Alexandria, VA. We were off the tarmac and flying, but still building the plane!

Present

Thankfully most of the plane has now been built, with modifications along the way, and no major crashes! We have a few courses to finish for recent students whose states require additional courses for licensure. From our initial 21 students, we have grown tremendously. We will end this academic year with around 185 active students, including a full cohort of 36 students this fall. Our small band of four fulltime faculty has grown to 13 for this fall, with over 25 adjunct faculty and facilitators assisting in courses, small groups, and residencies. We have been blessed with a close-knit team focused on our mission in supporting students to become counselors who, informed by a Catholic-Christian vision of the flourishing person, inspire themselves and others to have courage to trust, hope, and love.

While thankful for our growth, our joy has been in the amazing students the marketing and admission teams have brought our way and the success they have already achieved. The "proof in the pudding" has been the positive feedback from the students' supervisors at their clinical placement sites, with many students offered a professional counseling position at their site. While the licensing procedures vary from state to state, from a temporary form of licensure required for postgraduate supervision to no licensure until after the postgraduate supervision is over, all graduates have been able to be registered for state licensure as required by their individual states.

Future

We anticipate continued growth with a 20% increase in student enrollment this year. With our growing number of graduates and alumni, we hope to develop a supportive alumni association that would include mentoring of new students and ongoing benefits and collaboration with alumni and the university.

While this time of COVID-19 remains a unique and uncertain time for all, the online training of counseling skills and advanced interventions has proven a significant advantage for many of our students as telemental health services has dramatically increased. This change in service delivery format is more likely to increase than go away after this pandemic. Our students will be more ready than most for this ongoing intervention in the mental health field.

With a thankful heart to all who have helped make this journey so successful, we trust God for the grace to continue training students who counsel with the honor and respect due each person supporting their innate and indelible dignity regardless of their struggles during this time and the future.

fter closing in March of 2020 due to the global pandemic, The IPS Center for Psychological Services has reopened and is now offering telepsychology services. By expanding our services, we have been able to continue to pursue our mission of serving the mental health needs of our community and training doctoral level students.

The IPS Center is now accepting new telehealth clients for adult residents of Northern Virginia seeking individual psychotherapy. Through telepsychology, we are able to provide the community with high quality, affordable mental health services that take into account all aspects of a person: emotional, biological, social, cultural, spiritual, and psychological. We offer a sliding scale fee based on annual income and household size (typical fees range between \$20-50 per session).

Prospective patients are encouraged to reach out to us by phone (703-418-2111) or email (ipscenter@divinemercy. edu) to learn more about our services and complete a brief phone screening. They are also welcome to learn more about the IPS Center by visiting our website: ipscenter.org.

The IPS Center has also expanded our staff. Dr. Kristi Stefani, an alumna of IPS, has completed her post-doctoral training at the Center and is now serving as the Associate Director. We also have an immediate opening for a full-time master's level therapist. This position will involve overseeing client referral and intakes, assisting in the management of the IPS Center through various administrative duties, conducting marketing and outreach projects in Loudoun County, as well as providing individual therapy to adults, adolescents, children, and couples.

BECOMING ALL THINGS TO ALL PEOPLE

Center for Trauma and Resiliency Studies



The Center for Trauma and Resiliency Studies (CTRS) at Divine Mercy University opened in the fall of 2016, offering a training program through Green Cross Academy for Traumatology for students, faculty, alumni and interested community professionals. It is targeted toward certifications as Mental Health First Responders in times of disaster and traumatic situations.

In 2020, over 300 professionals received training to strengthen their skills for providing services to those in need of trauma intervention for matters such as PTSD, sexual trauma, domestic violence, human trafficking, grief.

As part of the Center, there will be a development of an ongoing Response Team of students, alumni, and interested community professionals capable of deploying in times of significant disaster or crisis anywhere in the United States. The goal is to assist recovery efforts with first responders to prevent compassion fatigue, collaborate in working with survivors in the field, and provide counseling services in the aftermath of disaster or crisis.

SPIRITUAL DIRECTION CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

he Spiritual Direction Certificate (SDC) program prepares students with a transformational experience that will enable them to be spiritual directors with the heart and mind of Jesus Christ.

The program is designed to provide knowledge, skills, and supervision for future spiritual directors. Participants seek to respond to the ongoing need for the followers of Jesus Christ to assist one another on their path of becoming, every day, more faithful disciples of the Lord.

Made up of six online classes, the program includes two four-day onsite residences and a practicum.

The online classes are offered three times a year, in eight-week segments. The pillars of the program include: integration of theological and human sciences as they relate to spiritual development; learning the art and skills of human interactions; and the fruitful experience of supervision. During the two years the program has been offered, 175 students have enrolled and are active in the six different courses.



MEET THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It gives me great happiness to be part of the Spiritual Direction Certificate Program, now in its second year at DMU. Having had the opportunity of serving as the project lead in the early planning stages of the program, I feel blessed to now be able to be part of its daily operations. Spiritual direction itself has been a great gift to me in my personal life and serving as a spiritual director myself is something that I really enjoy.

The team here at DMU has done an incredible job of completing the development of the courses. Now, we will continue to develop pieces that have to do with the mentoring of each student and personalizing the training experience for each. 


