Research Interests

Classical and Medieval theories of behavior, moral development, custom, and human law, as well as their relevance to contemporary issues in behavioral sciences, education, applied ethics, and political philosophy. Specific projects fall under four heads:

- The role of rational persuasion (and personal freedom) in effective moral and emotional education, especially in modern, pluralistic societies
- The rhetorical art and the effective development and governance of free human agents
- What was Aquinas's understanding of *consuetudo* (custom, usage, practice)? This project involves several papers in progress, especially one on its general nature in Aquinas, and one on its role in his legal and political philosophy.
- What does medieval moral and political philosophy have to contribute to contemporary discussions about the relationship of law and morality, especially the 'enforcement of morals' question?
